## LOG HOUSE RESTORATION 2019-2022: Part 3

Log Restoration Project. The Log House looks beautiful. The log restoration project has been our number one goal for many years. It is exciting to see the work being accomplished.



Restoration is underway since January with Lone Star Log Specialties of Hurst, Texas, as the principal contractor. The logs have been washed, hand sanded, and two coats of stain and a clear, matt sealant applied. Chinking has been repaired. Individual logs with cracking issues are being repaired. Lisa Braly is the project coordinator.

The last step of the log restoration process and the job of repainting wood trim will begin this



me job of repainting wood trim will begin this month. The Log House Committee hopes to have the interior of the log surfaces cleaned this summer.



Work on Log House windows and screens began in March. The windows look bright and beautiful. Riha Construction Co. is the contractor on this project. Windows panes are reglazed, broken glass panes replaced, and a rotten window repaired. The repaired screens are stored in the shed until repainted.

A generous donation by a chapter member made this restoration project possible.

The Log House Committee has been busy these past three years. If you are interested

COVER PHOTO: By Jon Hall. Statue of Benjamin Rush Milam, Milam Park, San Antonio. In December 1835, Milam, at age 47, led a volunteer Texan army into San Antonio in what has been called the Siege of Béxar. After several days of street-to-street fighting, Mexican General Martin Perfecto de Cos surrendered and removed the Mexican army under his command across the Rio Grande. This battle ended the first phase of hostilities between Texan colonists and the Mexican army. During the engagement Milam was killed in action, becoming an early hero of the Texas Revolution. The statue was created by American sculptor Bonnie MacLeary and commissioned for the 1936 Texas Centennial.
