

From the President:

Our October Chapter Meeting was held virtually on October 1st and we had our first speaker since the pandemic started! Amazingly, all went well!

Our speaker was Dr. Abbie Grubb, History Professor at San Jacinto Community College. She talked about the history of the Battleship Texas and we learned so much! It was commissioned in 1914 and, for six months, was the largest battleship in the world! It was the first battleship to launch a plane off her decks and, in 1944, was the flagship of Normandy. In 1948, Houston raised the money to have her brought to San Jacinto. She will soon be towed to dry dock for repairs, probably in Mobile, Alabama, for at least 18 months and then be returned to a port in Texas with high traffic, but not to San Jacinto.

Next month our meeting will be via ZOOM on November 5, 2020, at 10:30 am and our guest speaker will be Ann Sloane. She will talk to us about Women's Suffrage. Can you imagine not being allowed to vote?! Please try to join us!

Did you know...



LOG HOUSE TREASURES ~ These two paintings of frontiersmen being chased by Indians were painted by Mrs. Harriet Lewin Rather. In 1940 Dr. E. N. Gray donated these paintings to the Chapter to be "placed in the Log Cabin as a memorial to Mrs. Gentry," daughter of the artist.

Mrs. Harriet Lewin Rather. "What do we know about this lady who painted our frontiersmen and Indians? She was born in Tennessee in 1808, grew up and married in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Then when she was about 32 years of age with at least two children her husband apparently felt the lure of the land in the Republic of Texas.....

An entry in a Tuscaloosa deed book dated 1841 gives us the name of Harriet's husband: 'Deed of gift from Charles Lewin to daughter, Harriet, wife of James Rather....slave deed.' There is a record of James Rather buying 640 acres in Fort Bend County in 1840. His name then disappears from the records, and in 1845 Harriet and son William Samuel Rather are on the poll lists of Texas. In 1850 they are shown in Houston along with daughter Mary Frances who has become the wife of Abraham Gentry, who made his mark building early Texas railroads. Harriet continues to be listed in the Houston city directories until 1879-80 when she apparently died. Her grave has not been found but the Gentry's are buried in Glenwood Cemetery." *Docent Manual: Ilyne McJimsey Olson, Genealogy Researcher, member of SJCDRT*.

Dr. E. N. Gray (1861-1940) was personal friends with Mrs. Gentry and saw the paintings every time he visited Mrs. Gentry over a period of many years. At her death in 1917, Mrs. Gentry bequeathed the paintings to Dr. Gray because she knew how much he valued them. Our membership records show that his sister Fanny Gray Dumble (1855 -1935) and her daughters Rosalie Dumble Davis and Milly Gray Dumble were early members of our chapter.

His Houston Chronicle obituary dated October 20, 1940 states: As a small boy he lived on the courthouse square and was an eyewitness to many exciting events. He was the second son and youngest child of A. C. and Amanda Bostick Gray. He was born on July 13, 1861 and although only a small boy at the end of the civil war he remembered the coming of the Yankee soldiers and the subsequent events. Dr. Gray attended private schools in Houston, there being no public schools in those days, and later enrolled in the Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia, where he graduated in 1893.

Dr. Gray was a prominent Houston physician, a charter member and President of the Harris County Medical Association in 1905. He was also a past president of the Sons of the Republic of Texas. His father had been editor of the early Houston Telegraph newspaper. His grandfather William Fairfax Gray came from Virginia in 1836 and received several appointments from Sam Houston. He served as the first clerk of the first house of representatives of the new republic and later the first district attorney of this district. Dr. Gray was a student and author of Texas history. He wrote a series of articles for the Chronicle relating to Texas during the Reconstruction Era. Source: *Docent Manual*

"This year's ornament design was inspired by the south facade of the statehouse and pays homage to the very first Texas Capitol Ornament designed in 1996. Finished in 24K gold, this threedimensional keepsake features the Capitol dome and south entrance, colored in the same hue as the Texas Sunset Red granite used to build the Capitol. Above the south entrance are the six seals of Texas. The Capitol dome is complimented by the American flag and Texas flag, flying just as they do every day over Capitol Square. The doors open to reveal the statehouse south foyer, framed by the marble statues of Stephen F. Austin and Sam Houston, which were sculpted by celebrated artist Elisabet Ney in her Hyde Park studio in Austin, Texas. Inside, you can see the circa 1936 terrazzo floor leading to the Capitol rotunda that showcases portraits of the Presidents of the Repub-







