San Jacinto Day Highlights

2009 San Jacinto Day Commemorative Ceremony



The official San Jacinto Day Commemorative Ceremony was held on Tuesday, April 21, 2009. Approximately 300 people attended to celebrate the 173rd anniversary of the most significant battle in the Western Hemisphere. This year's ceremony was held in memory of our own Marian Prestbo Beckham, a 53 year member of San Jacinto Chapter, Past President and a San Jacinto Descendant. In addition, the late Ron Stone, John Houchins and Ray Miller, KSJ, were also recognized during the ceremony.

The ceremony featured Archie P. Mc Donald, Regent's Professor, Stephen F. Austin State University, as the keynote speaker and Ron Stone, Jr., as Master of Ceremonies. Albert Sidney Johnston Canton #11, Patriarchs Militant, and Odd Fellows provided the presentation of colors, with an invocation by Nan Morris, President General, San Jacinto Descendants. Kelly Fisher, President, San Jacinto Chapter, Children of the Republic of Texas, led the pledges to the U.S. flag and the Texas flag. The Deer Park High School Orchestra played for the singing of the National Anthem and "Texas Our Texas".

Other speakers for the event were Trey Strake, Chairman, San Jacinto Historical Advisory Board and Sam Houston IV, KSJ, who read the Battle Report from San Jacinto, written by his great grandfather, General Sam Houston. The Fife and Drum Corp played "Will You Come to the Bower?" A memorial wreath was laid at the base of the San Jacinto Monument and a salute to Texas patriots was conducted by the Texas Army and SRT Texian Volunteers.



Betty Edwards, District VI Representative, State DRT, and Eron Brimberry Tynes, President, San Jacinto Chapter, recognized the Thelma Maresh scholarship winners. A total of \$6,000.00 was presented to three high school seniors, Yo Li (1st place), Andrew Petry (2nd place), and Jennifer Nguyen (3rd place). Andrew and Jennifer attended the ceremony with their families. Yo Li was unable to attend. Honorable Mentions went to Walker Young and Brenda Tran, who received \$500 each.

In closing, Eron Tynes said, "As Daughters we are proud of our 117 years of service to the people of the state of Texas. We are honored and humbled to be entrusted with the sacred duty of preserving the historic sites of the Texas Revolution so dear to every Texan's heart. We are proud to be custodians of the Alamo and proud of our heritage here at the San Jacinto Battleground".

The ceremony was organized under the auspices of the San Jacinto Historical Advisory Board, with Will Haddock and Nancy Burch serving as Co-Chairs for the San Jacinto Day planning committee. Other San Jacinto Chapter members serving on the planning committee were Gina Bouchard, Jan DeVault and Eron Tynes.

After the ceremony, many attendees went over to the Monument Inn, for a celebratory lunch. The restaurant was filled with Daughters, Sons, San Jacinto Descendants, the Texian Army and many others as we celebrated this most significant of our Honor Days.







Margaret (Mrs. Kenneth) Fitzgibbons passed away on April 12, 2009. She became a member of the San Jacinto Chapter on September 30, 1989, DRT # 16900. She was an Honorary President General and a member of Fort Sumter Chapter 1901, UDC in Sacramento, California. Mrs. Fitzgibbons, who served as President of the California Division from 1978 to 1980, was a recipient of the World War II Cross of Military Service for her work as a Lieutenant in the Army Nurse Corps, the Jefferson Davis Historical Gold Medal. and the Winnie Davis Medal.

She served as Recorder General of Crosses of Military Service (1982–84) and as Historian General (1986–88). She was elected Honorary President General in 2002 and at the time of her death was serving as a member of the Memorial Building Board of Trustees. She is survived by her husband Kenneth, daughter Jean, and son Michael.

May 7th Meeting "James Bowie and the Famous Bowie Knife"

Denton Bryant's presentation on James (Jim) Bowie provided us with a rich insight into the life and legend of this famous Texas hero. Born in Kentucky in 1796, Bowie grew up in Louisiana where he became a plantation owner and a businessman. He moved to Texas in 1828, engaged in land speculation, and became a Mexican citizen. He married the daughter of the governor of the province of Texas in 1831 and had two children.

The first Bowie knife, designed by Bowie himself, was made by James Black, a blacksmith. The knife was heat treated for durability and had a special knife guard to protect the hand when in use. The "Bowie knife" became famous because of its unique design, curved upper blade and handle guard.

Jim was an adventurer at heart, and joined the fight for the independence of Texas. He participated in the Battle of Concepcion, the Grass Fight, and was the commander of volunteers at the Alamo. He shared command with William Barrett Travis during the siege of the Alamo. He was killed during the battle on March 6, 1836.

Friends of the Log House

Our San Jacinto Chapter is blessed with a permanent home where we can meet, educate groups, and entertain guests. The original chapter members who sacrificed to bring this house to a reality in 1936 are depending on us to continue the legacy of our heritage.

The Log House Museum functions separately from the chapter. We have a separate board, bank account, fund raisers, etc., even though we are closely aligned with the chapter.

We are all aware of the necessity of maintaining our own homes. The Log House has the same needs. It costs about \$1000 per month to keep the house open and functioning.

Where do the funds come from? We use funds from grants, the sale of Country Store items, rentals by outside groups, tax-free donations from our members and other non-member supporters. Current membership expires June 30, so it is time again to help pay our bills. Membership levels are as follows:

\$25 Texas Star \$50 Silver Star \$100 Shining Star \$250 Gold Star \$500 Lone Star \$1000 Platinum Star

We have about 370 members. If we can get 200 of our members to donate the \$25 minimum, we would reap \$5000, enough to maintain the house for five months. If those 200 members donate \$50, then we could stay open for 10 months. Our home needs a steady supply of funds every year to continue to remain open.

When you have out-of town guests this summer, or throughout the year, bring them to tour our Log House and gardens. It's a lovely oasis in the middle of urban Houston. Call the house for a special tour, or to get the hours that it is open for the public (713-371-7845).

All those who love Texas history are eligible to become a *Friend*. Please consider this when you get ready to renew your membership dues to the chapter, and encourage your family and friends to join us. We want to see that "star quality" from all of you!
