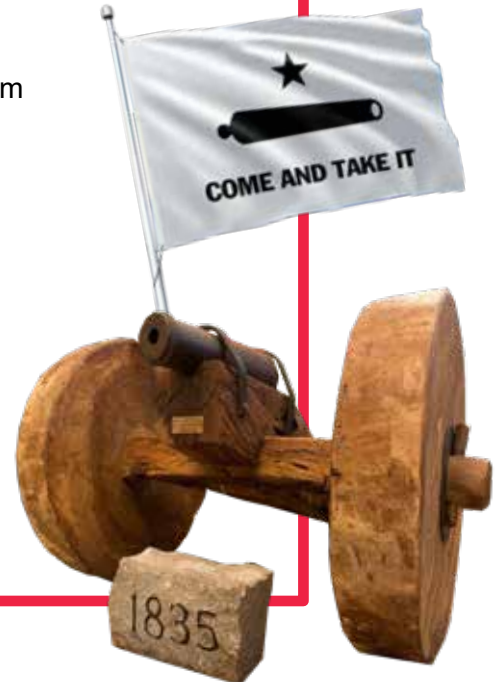

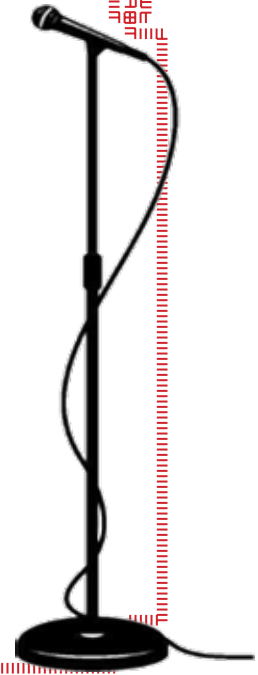
April's Guest Speaker & San Jacinto Luncheon

The Anson Jones Ceremony

The Anson Jones Ceremony on Texas Statehood Day was held at historic Glenwood Cemetery on February 19, 2024.

Bart Dawson, SRT, was the master of ceremonies at the gravesites of Anson Jones and his wife Mary. Program speakers were Gwen Koch, representing San Jacinto Chapter DRT telling the story of Mrs. Mary Smith Jones, widow of Anson Jones, elected as first president of Daughters of the Republic of Texas in 1891 and serving until her death on December 31, 1907; Jerrick Juliette, Past Master, Anson Jones Lodge #1416 AF & AM; with Keynote Speaker, Kameron Searle speaking about Anson Jones: Doctor, Soldier, and Architect of Annexation. Anson Jones arrived in Brazoria in 1833 where he established a medical practice. He served as a surgeon at the Battle of San Jacinto and would later serve the Republic of Texas as Senator, Secretary of State, and eventually President in 1844.

Mary Jones heard the canons at San Jacinto and saw its flag raised in victory. As president of DRT, with the Alamo in disrepair and the Long Barracks a mercantile store, the buildings were saved and over 300 acres was purchased at the San Jacinto Battleground. The objective to “perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved and maintained the independence of Texas” was established.

San Jacinto Chapter CRT Chaplain, Lorien placed a wreath for Anson and Mary Jones. The Texas Militia presented a Black-powder Salute.

On this solemn day 133 years ago, as he lowered the flag, Anson Jones said, “the Republic of Texas is no more”.

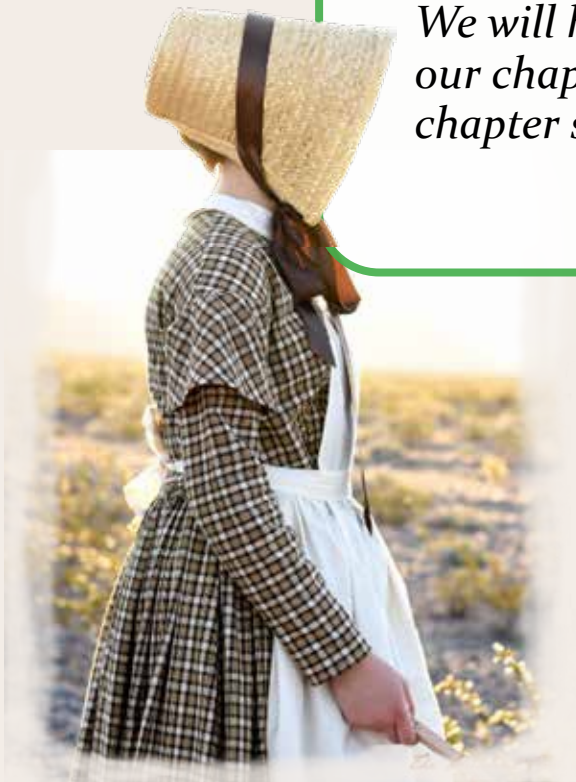

Upholding Our Texas Legacy

Since the massacre at Goliad on a Palm Sunday, March 27, where 350 men, after surrendering, were taken out and shot, the Texian Army continued its retreat east. On April 12 and 13, General Sam Houston Ferried his troops across the swollen Brazos River using the steamship "Yellowstone." He then marched to the site of present day Hempstead, where two cannons awaited them. The two cannons were donated by the people of Cincinnati and would become known as the "Twin Sisters."

On April 15, General Houston and the Texian Army came to a fork in the road where they could either go to Nacogdoches or move south towards Harrisburg. They turned south and marched towards that swampy prairie where the San Jacinto River and Buffalo Bayou converge.

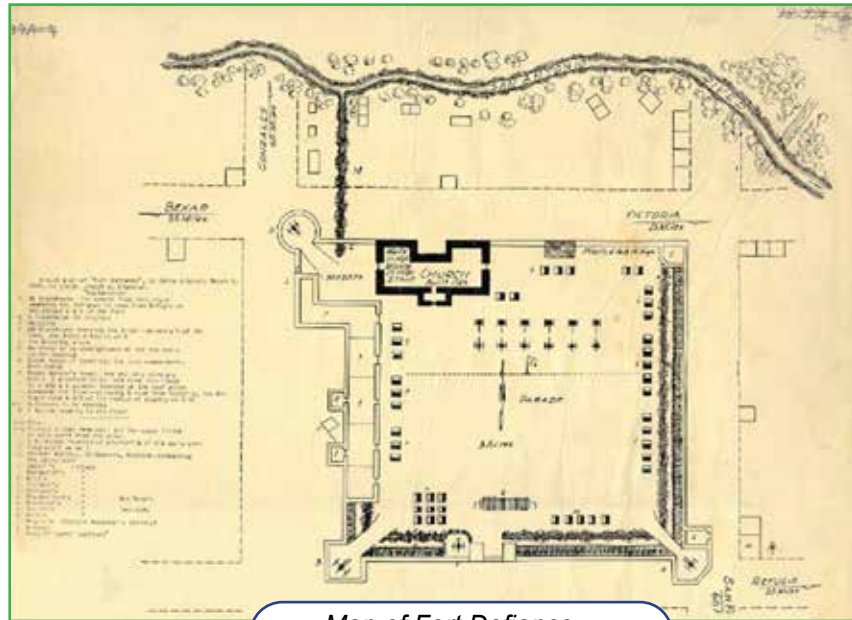

Fannin was forced to surrender. He and his men were promised fair treatment and parole, but General Santa Anna ordered that all of the men should be shot.



On March 27, 1836, 320 Texian prisoners were executed, the largest loss of life in the cause for Texas independence.



“Remember Goliad!” became one of the great battle cries at San Jacinto.

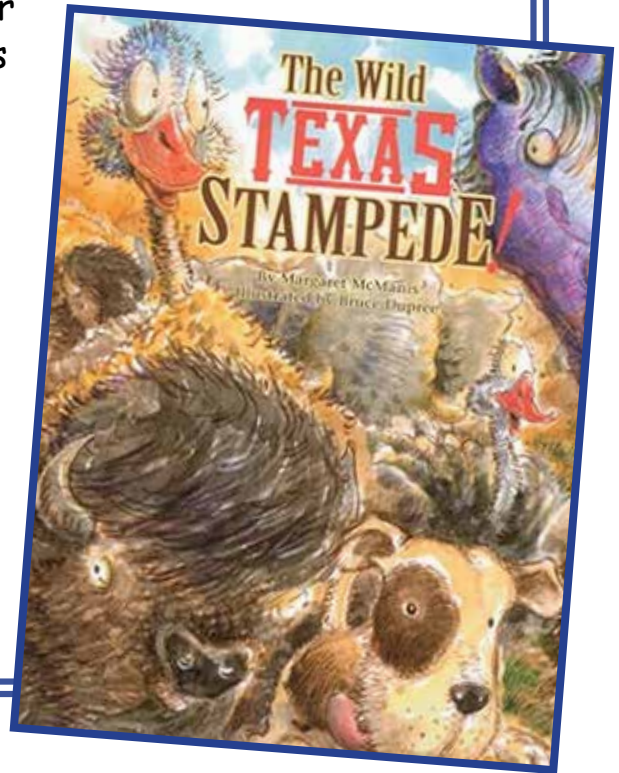

Book Corner

Having just enjoyed a wonderful Chapter Field Trip to the Varner-Hogg Plantation in West Columbia, Texas, this book is a perfect one to review. The Hogg Family bought the plantation in 1901, just after many buildings there were damaged by the 1900 Hurricane. James Hogg was famous, not only for being the first Texas-born governor of the state, but also for his menagerie of wild animals. He had elephants imported from India, ostriches from Africa, and two buffaloes from Jackson Hole, Wyoming.

The *Wild Texas Stampede!* is a fictional story which could have taken place at the Varner-Hogg Plantation. James Hogg's wife died when his famous daughter, Ima Hogg, was just 13, so she was frequently left in charge of her younger brothers as her dad had to travel to Austin for elections and meetings. The youngest brother, Tom, was especially mischievous! This is the story of one of his adventures with the buffaloes!

The author, Margaret McManis, spent her childhood only a short ride away from the Varner-Hogg Plantation. She has also written a book on the gardens at Bayou Bend and how they were influenced by the gardens at Versailles, France.

2024.01: Proposed Amendments to Article VIII

The chapter will be asked to vote at the May Chapter Meeting on a request by the treasurer to be removed from the Pioneer Memorial Log House Committee in Article VIII -- Section 1 (A)(i) and from the Friends of the Log House in Article VIII -- Section 3 (C)

Text of Bylaws Amendment Proposals: Spring 2024

AMENDMENT 2024.01

ARTICLE VIII—PIONEER MEMORIAL LOG HOUSE COMMITTEE

Section 1. Purpose.

A. Committee. The fifth vice president will serve as chair of the committee. In addition to the chair, the members of the committee will be:
