My Journey to DRT Janice McNatt

After 63 years I became a member of the DRT and had two additional ancestors approved as supplements shortly thereafter. My ancestors that qualify were Crawford Trees, his wife Anna Minerva Kimmel and her Mother Katherine Hunsaker.

You might ask what took me so long and the answer would be - working, putting in 60 hour weeks for many years in Cardiology Research in both Dallas and Houston, for a total of 39 years. Genealogy has been one of my life time hobbies for over 40 years. I joined the DAR in Feb 2010 and spent most of my free time submitting 7 additional supplements and acting as the Friendswood Chapter Registrar from 2012-2015. Highlights of this work were getting approved 130 new members and over 80 new supplements, and in the process cinching the 2013 most new member award for our Chapter in Texas with 51 members in one year and 3 additional new members for other chapters. I completed the 4 DAR genealogy courses and presented 25 genealogy workshops to become a Volunteer Genealogist and Field Genealogists for the DAR. I had a significant lead in Texas for the Volunteer Genealogists of the Year Award when at the beginning of the final quarter of the contest year the new administration decided to change the contest rules and make it retroactive back to January 1st of the contest year. After losing 4,000 points and still finishing 2nd I decided it might be time to spend my volunteer time with a different organization. I always wanted to join the DRT and was delighted to find out I qualified with 3 of my ancestors. I contacted Margie and she was extremely helpful in submitting my application and the required documents. I am still a DAR member but do not participate as much as I use to.

The Trees, Kimmels, and Hunsakers were all Mennonites living in Pennsylvania in the late 1700's. After the Revolution several of them received bounty land in Kentucky where they moved their families in search of a milder climate. Upon arrival they found the local Indians very hostile, and decided instead to move to Union Co, Illinois in 1815 with others of the Brethren faith. They worked hard and established townships, organized churches, schools, and local businesses. In 1842 Anna Minerva Kimmel's father Daniel Kimmel died and Crawford Tree's father Jacob Trees became her guardian until she reached 18 years old. During the late 1830's and early 1840's Union County Illinois experienced horrible floods and many lost their crops in repetitive years. Due to standing waters Union County was also hit with a Yellow Fever epidemic causing many deaths and hardship for the survivors.

Crawford Trees, along with many from Union County, decided to move to Peters Colony in North Texas in 1845 near Dallas where they could receive free land and live in a drier area. Included in the wagon train were his future wife Anna Minerva Kimmel and her widowed Mother Katherine Hunsaker-Kimmel, her brother Phillip Kimmel, and sister Melvina. The adults received land grants for 640 acres each and were required to work their land for 5 years before the land was officially transferred. I do have copies of their land grants which I received from the Texas Archives.

There were Indians in North Texas but they were friendly compared to other areas. They would occasionally ride down and try to steal livestock at night so they had to be watched closely. Crawford was a stockman raising cattle and horses and in 1849 left his wife Anna and their young infant daughter Catherine to travel to the California Gold Fields. He returned in 1851 with considerable gold with which he purchased more land and livestock. He was the 10th largest land owner in the area southwest of Dallas by 1863. He was very lucky to find gold and live to return home since during the mid and late 1850's 50% of the men that ventured to the California Gold Fields died from Cholera due to the horrid living conditions. He also fought in the Civil War again leaving his wife and now 10 children to manage their ranch.

I qualified to become a DRT member through my ancestors who were citizens of the Republic of Texas. All three of my ancestors have bronze plaques on their graves indicating they were Citizens of the Republic of Texas. They are buried in the Trees Cemetery located in Duncanville just outside of Dallas. I am proud to be a 5th generation Texan, and proud of the tribulations my ancestors had to overcome to own and become productive citizens of Texas.
