May you enjoy this glorious time of year. We look forward to seeing you in the new year.



Mary McCutcheon Smith McCrory Jones

This is the text of a talk given at the grave sites of Dr. Anson Jones and his wife, Mary, at Glenwood Cemetery in Houston on February 19, 2023 to celebrate Texas Statehood Day.

For a person with such a common name, Mary Smith had a very uncommon life. She was born July 24, 1819, in Arkansas Territory. This month we celebrate her life of 88 years which ended on December 31, 1907 in Houston, Texas.

Her dad died in Arkansas in 1833, so she, her mom, and 4 younger siblings moved to Texas, to Brazoria County, arriving in 1834 after a difficult journey crossing the swollen Sabine River on a raft! Mary was just 14.

In 1835, her Mom married John Woodruff, a widower with six children. Mary was the oldest of the now 11 children, so she played a major supporting role in her family.

The next year, in March of 1836, the entire family ran from Santa Ana's army during the Runaway Scrape and sheltered in Clear Creek, 8 miles from the San Jacinto Battlefield where they heard the cannons' roar during the battle.

The City of Houston was founded in August 1836. Her family moved there in December of that year. At that time, there were no houses in Houston, not even tents. Everyone just camped out as they built their homes. There she met and married Hugh McCrory, a soldier in the Texian army, on July 18, 1837, when she was just 18 years old. They were the first couple to receive a marriage license in Harris County! Sadly, her husband Hugh died suddenly of an illness just 7 weeks after their wedding.

So Mary moved back home with her family and helped care for the 4 new daughters of the family along with her other siblings. She met Dr. Anson Jones when he stayed at her parents' Boarding House. They married May 17, 1840, when Mary was just 20 years old.

When Dr. Jones became President of the Republic of Texas, Mary became the last First Lady of the Republic, serving from 1844 – 1846. On February 19, 1846, Dr. Jones lowered the Texas flag and famously said, "The Republic of Texas is no more". By 1845, Anson and Mary had 3 children, and got the news that Mary's mother had died (aged 45), with Mary's youngest sister being just 4 years old. In 1847, Mary's stepfather died, leaving Mary and Anson as guardians of Mary's 4 youngest siblings along with the now 4 children of their own.

Mary McCutcheon Smith McCrory Jones

Dr. and Mrs. Anson Jones built a plantation near Washington-on-the-Brazos which they called 'Barrington' after Dr. Jones' birthplace in Massachusetts. The house itself is now part of the park there.

But sadly, Anson Jones had a debilitating accident and later died by suicide in January 1858, leaving 39-year-old Mary a widow again. The family was soon destitute and had to sell their plantation. Luckily, Dr. Ashbel Smith helped Mary to buy land on Goose Creek, near Baytown, where she raised her children and young siblings.


In 1879, 60-year-old Mary returned to live in Houston. Her son Cromwell was Chief Justice of Harris County and her daughter Sallie also lived in Houston. Mary had nursing skills and throughout her life helped women during and after childbirth. We can see her strong maternal role – caring for her siblings, then her children, and then all of these many pioneer women.

'The Daughters of the Republic of Texas' was founded in November 1891 and Mary Smith Jones became its first president, serving for 17 years until her death. Mary perceived her role of president of the DRT as a "mother to her many daughters".

In 1899, at the age of 70, she said "I have literally grown up and old with the state of Texas".

She died in her daughter Sallie's home in December 1907 at the age of 88. Mary McCutcheon Smith McCrory Jones was truly a strong founding mother of the state of Texas.

Red Family Grand Square Piano

History of the Red Family Grand Square Piano

The Red Family grand square piano is a prized exhibit in San Jacinto Chapter's Early Texas History Collection. Mrs. Erette Red, San Jacinto Chapter President 1969-1972, and President General Daughters of the Republic of Texas 1973-1975, donated the piano to San Jacinto Chapter in memory of her late husband, Dr. George Plunkett Red.

This piano in our Pioneer Memorial Log House was purchased by Dr. Red's grandmother about 1861. She had a degree in music and taught music at Live Oak Seminary, founded in 1850 and located at Old Gay Hill, Washington County, Texas. Tuition was \$10 per month. The school taught 25-30 young women at a time.

The piano was manufactured by Vose & Sons circa 1861. Similar pianos are showcased at the new Daughters of the Republic Headquarters in Austin, and at Sam Houston's "Woodland Home" in Huntsville.





Red Family Grand Square Piano

It has "come back to life" in 2023 after being fitted with an electronic keyboard, making current use of this antique piano which can no longer be properly tuned. Martha Jorgensen spearheaded this project to carefully remove the original keyboard, wrapping it to protect the key and hammer section, and placing it in a custombuilt cedar crate for storage. The keyboard can be reinserted into the piano to restore it to its original configuration. The wood SHINES after being hand waxed twice with museum quality furniture wax. Thank you to Martha and other interested chapter members for donating toward these expenses.

The stool which sits near the piano is an original companion piece to the grand square piano. It is covered in green velvet and has carved wooden legs painted green.

Come to chapter meetings to hear Martha Jorgensen play "Texas Our Texas", the first music played "in tune" on the piano in many years.
