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San Jacinto Chapter Recognized in DRT Book

San Jacinto Chapter will be recognized in the new DRT book titled: *The Daughters: A Dozen Decades of DRT,* for our work establishing the San Jacinto Battleground, erecting the Memorial Boulders and the Sundial, building our Log House, and our current scholarship program.

The following is a preview from the section discussing our Log House.

Excerpt:

Pioneer Memorial Log House Museum -

As 1936 approached, chapter members embarked on the project to build the Log House as part of the Centennial Celebration. ... The chapter formed a committee to raise the necessary money and to construct the Log House. In the midst of the Great Depression, members raised almost \$4,000, principally from donations of one dollar or less. The logs were donated. Stones used to construct the fire place and chimney were collected from sites with significance to Texas pioneers and Texas independence.

The Log House was dedicated on March 2, 1936, the 100th anniversary of the Texas Declaration of Independence ... to honor our Texas pioneer ancestors. ... The City of Houston donated the site in Hermann Park for the Log House in honor of the Allen brothers ... In 2012, over 800 school children and their parents visited the Log House during "Texas Pioneer Days" held during Spring Break.

The 75th Anniversary of the Log House was celebrated by the chapter in 2011. In 2012, the Greater Houston Preservation Alliance named the San Jacinto Chapter the winner of a "Good Brick Award" for stewardship of the Pioneer Memorial Log House.

Texas Heritage Garden

This is one of the two Belinda's Dream from the Antique Rose Emporium in Independence, TX, which I planted in the Texas Heritage Garden this summer. These roses are classified as the new Earthkind Roses, which is a cross between the Jersey Beauty and a Tiffany. It is a fast growing and sturdy shrub with few disease problems, a prolific bloomer with a distinctive fragrance of their own. Antique roses, many of which were found roses from old homesteads throughout Texas were originally brought here by the earlier settlers and are grown on their own rootstock which have been able to thrive without care. The Texas Rose Rustlers group was responsible for finding many of these original antique roses in the 80s.

November 1st Meeting

Author Steven Fenberg 10:00 am

Author Steven Fenberg will talk about the subject of his award-winning book, *Unprecedented Power: Jesse Jones, Capitalism and the Common Good*, at the November chapter meeting. A graduate of Bellaire High School and the University of Texas, Mr. Fenberg is the community affairs officer for Houston Endowment where he has pursued a variety of projects on Jesse Jones and his undeniable imprint on Houston in the first half of the 20th century, as well as his significant influence on the entire nation.

Prior to joining Houston Endowment, the philanthropic foundations established by Jones and his wife in 1937, Mr. Fenberg wrote about political, environmental, and social issues for magazines and newspapers. He wrote and produced AIDS: Just Say Know, an educational play that was performed throughout greater Houston in theaters, community centers, churches, and synagogues, and as inservice training for teachers and law enforcement officials when the disease was in its infancy and misinformation had instilled widespread fear.

He first wrote a biographical sketch about Jones in 1992 for Houston Endowment and was intrigued to discover that Jones was the most powerful person in the nation next to President Franklin Roosevelt throughout FDR's entire administration. subsequently assembled an extensive archive of Jones's personal and business papers, created permanent exhibits about him that are now installed at Houston Endowment and Rice University, conducted an oral history program to interview those who knew Jones, and served as executive producer and writer on PBS's Emmy Award-winning documentary film Brother, Can You Spare a Billion? The Story of Jesse H. Jones, narrated by Walter Cronkite. He also has been a consultant for the Will Rogers Museum in Claremore, Oklahoma, and the DePelchin Children's Center in Houston, both institutions relevant to Jones's story.
